Advocacy Visit and Community Sensitization on Ending Child Early Marriage and Domestic Servitude

1. Background and Purpose of the Visit

The African Faith and Justice Network (AFJN) conducted a community engagement and advocacy visit to HRM Igwe Dr. Emeka Ilouno JP, the Traditional Ruler of Ifitedunu Community, Oyi LGA, Anambra State, as part of ongoing efforts to address child early and forced marriage and domestic servitude.

The visit aimed to:

- Engage the traditional institution on its leadership role in child protection.
- Present AFJN's request for collaboration.
- Introduce a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) and Community-Based Child Monitoring System (CBCMS) for review, adoption, and implementation.
- Sensitize community members on the harmful impacts of child early marriage and domestic servitude.

2. Advocacy Engagement with the Traditional Ruler



Upon arrival, **HRM Igwe Dr. Emeka Ilouno JP** warmly received the AFJN team and **mobilized women from across Ifitedunu Community**, demonstrating strong leadership and commitment to child protection.

A **separate strategic discussion** was held with the Traditional Ruler, during which the team:

- Presented AFJN's advocacy objectives.
- Submitted the **MoU template** for regulating child placement and preventing exploitation.
- Explained the proposed Community-Based Child Monitoring System (CBCMS).

In response, HRM Igwe Dr. Emeka Ilouno JP publicly pledged his commitment to ending



child early marriage and domestic servitude in Ifitedunu Community. As a symbolic gesture of support and encouragement, the Igwe generously distributed tubers of yam to every participant present at the meeting.

3. Community Sensitization in Ifitedunu



Following the engagement with the Traditional Ruler, the AFJN team conducted a **community sensitization session**, educating participants on:

- The dangers of child early marriage and domestic servitude.
- The long-term impact on children's health, education, and dignity.
- The role of parents, women leaders, and traditional institutions in child protection.

Community members actively participated,

asking questions and expressing willingness to support initiatives aimed at safeguarding children.

4. Market Outreach and Sensitization at Awkuzu Market



As part of the engagement activities, the team led by Rev. Sr. Theresa Anyabuike carried out a market sensitization and outreach at Awkuzu Market.

During the outreach, market women shared **disturbing firsthand information**, including:

- That many children in domestic servitude are minors brought from Abakaliki, Ebonyi State, and are widespread across Anambra State.
- Calls for **urgent intervention by both Ebonyi and Anambra State Governments** to stop child trafficking and exploitation.
- Emotional testimonies of encountering children as young as 10 years old selling pure water late at night, exposed to abuse, rape, and sexual exploitation.



Reports that many of these children have **no access to reporting mechanisms**, no protection, and no safe spaces.

Participants expressed deep frustration over societal and government inaction and emphasized that children are being used as cheap labor and sex objects due to poverty and lack of protection.

5. Community Response and Appreciation

The market women and community members **commended AFJN** for bringing attention to the issue and strongly appealed to:

- The Traditional Rulers Council
- Ebonyi and Anambra State Governments
- Law enforcement and child protection agencies

They called for urgent and coordinated action to end child early marriage and domestic servitude.

6. Key Outcomes of the Engagement

- Secured commitment from **HRM Igwe Dr. Emeka Ilouno JP** to champion the fight against child early marriage and domestic servitude.
- Submission of MoU and CBCMS framework for review and adoption.
- Increased community awareness and dialogue on child protection.
- Documentation of critical field evidence on child trafficking and exploitation routes.
- Strengthened trust between AFJN, traditional institutions, and grassroots women.

7. Appeal to the Traditional Rulers Council

AFJN formally presented an appeal to the **Traditional Rulers Council** calling for:

- Community declarations banning child early and forced marriage and domestic servitude.
- Support for CBCMS implementation.
- Enforcement of child protection laws through traditional structures.
- Endorsement of MoUs regulating domestic child placement.
- Regular community dialogues promoting education and skills over exploitation.

8. Conclusion and Way Forward

The advocacy visits to Ifitedunu Community and Awkuzu Market reaffirmed the critical role of traditional leadership and grassroots women in ending harmful practices. The commitment demonstrated by HRM Igwe Dr. Emeka Ilouno JP, combined with the voices

of market women, provides a strong foundation for sustained advocacy, policy engagement, and community-driven child protection mechanisms.

AFJN remains committed to working closely with traditional rulers, government agencies, and community structures to ensure **every child is protected**, **educated**, **and empowered**.
